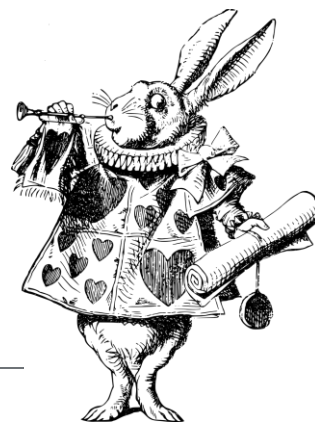

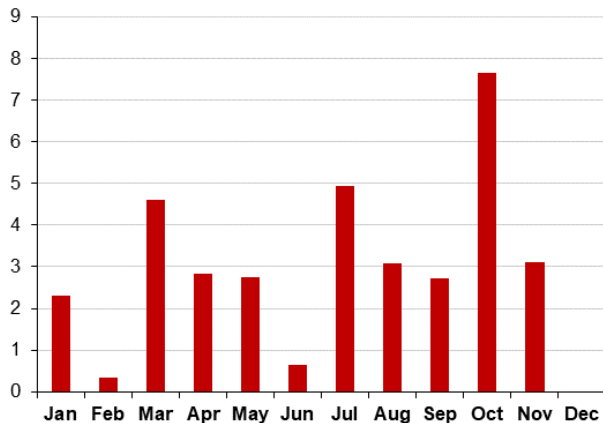
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Weather report: October - November 2023

Well, here we are again, nearly at the end of another year with just one month to go. Firstly, I must say how saddened I am to hear the passing of David Hull, a great guy who will be much missed. He was an avid follower of my rainfall reports: as a farmer he wanted to make sure his beloved flocks and herds were well fed and the grass and forage needs to be watered by the dreaded RAIN!



Speaking of which, both October, November and, in fact, this year have played a large part in breaking a number of records both for me and the surrounding area of Huntingfield. Where to start? Well let's just take the last two months during which we have experienced three named storms; Babet, Ciaran and Debi. Not unusual for this time of the year (who remembers the great storm of Oct 1987?). They weren't notable for particularly strong winds around

here but the rainfall was a different story, especially in the case of Ciaran which managed to dump 1.54" (39.1mm) on us in the space of 3 days and went right through the centre of Huntingfield. The middle of this storm passed right over us with the central pressure dropping to 955.2 HPa (or Millibars) - the lowest I've ever recorded. Nationally, it meant it took longer than usual to boil a kettle of water: any physicists and meteorologists amongst readers will know why.

October 2023 is the wettest month I have ever recorded with 7.64" (194.01mm) of rain. The total rainfall for Oct and Nov 2023 is 10.76" (273.3 mm), compared to 2022 when it was 8.58" (217.93 mm). I suspect there will be a little more rain before the end of November to add to the total. Now to another record which has already been broken: so far, this year has the highest rainfall I've recorded, standing at 34.96" (887.96mm). Previously, the highest was in 2008 when there was 34.1" (866.3mm). So yes, it's been a soggy year to say the least!

What is evident is that in line with world weather events, ours are also becoming more extreme in one way or another and it is being driven by ever more extreme jet stream behaviour. What's the winter going to be like? Who knows? Please don't believe the hyperbole of some of the press who are at best using seaweed for forecasts. Best wishes for the festive period, stay warm and healthy.

Nature Notes



At the time of writing, we are due to experience the first spell of cold weather this winter and signs in the natural world are also pointing

towards approaching colder conditions. The leaves have already turned to their lovely autumn colour and are starting to fall, forming a crunchy brown carpet underfoot.

As the leaves fall from bushes bright coloured berries are revealed which provide vital winter food for birds and other



animals. The colours of these berries range from white Snowberries and Mistletoe to bright red Hawthorn and Holly and the blue/black Ivy and Sloes. All these berries are eaten by birds such as Blackbirds and Thrushes, some of these species travelling to the UK from as far away as Eastern Europe.



We already have flocks of Fieldfare and Redwings seen locally and a more exotic looking species might well join them soon. This

is the Waxwing: flocks of these colourful, Starling-sized birds have arrived along the east coast of Britain in the last few weeks. In fact, this winter will most likely be a 'Waxwing Year' and some are already as close by as Lowestoft. These birds are pinkish grey in colour with yellow and red in the wings and tail, a bandit mask and a very noticeable crest. They love to eat berries, particularly Rowan and Pyracantha and flocks are often spotted in places such as gardens, town streets or even supermarket car parks. So do keep an eye out as you travel locally - and an ear too as they have a jingling call.

Talking of jingles and berries we are nearing the season of the year when we place bells and berries in our

homes, part of a tradition that dates back to pagan times. Robins are also part of the season: a bird that we all see in our garden, especially if you're digging. These beautiful friendly birds feature on millions of Christmas cards, reminding us to feed our garden birds or at least keep some thawed water available to help them survive the predicted cold weather.

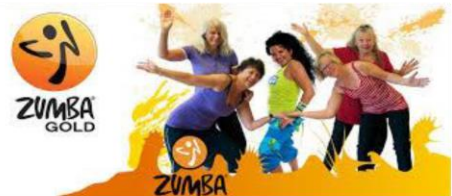
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Hub News

Your village Hub – busy and getting busier!



The Warm Welcome space at the Hub is being increasingly used. Do please let us

know if you've been in, simply by logging your visit in the foyer. You don't have to leave your name, just record the date, how many were with you and for how long, with any other comments. When you drop by you'll see the Warm Welcomes space has grown – we've expanded the free-to-use book-swap library and added two more comfy seats in the foyer. Please make the most of it (and tell your friends – there's free tea and coffee too!).

At the AGM last May the trustees reported that your Hub was achieving 11.5% in booking capacity, a figure we believed could be substantially improved. We're delighted to report now that various recent initiatives are already showing real promise – in October capacity grew to 12.71% and so far in November it's reached 16.46%.



Our website www.hub4all.org has recorded 5,584 web visits so far this year* with an additional increase of +532 in the last 30 days (to end October). Using data such as visitor engagement to rank against similar sized websites, web specialists Go Daddy now score your Hub at 91% for web performance. And in the last four weeks we've reached 1,300 people which is an increase of 303% on last month across all Hub social media platforms.

David was born on the 26th August 1946 at Poplars Farm, Steeple in Essex. The farm was about 80 acres of grass, where his parents milked cows, made hay for sale in London and broke horses to sell to the Army.

A shock to us all was David's passing on Sunday 15th October. He was always up early every day to go and look at his stock. I still don't know how he did it on those

freezing cold, dark mornings: it was because he was driven and absolutely loved what he did, an attitude passed down through the generations.

His real passion was cows; however, with sheep he both hated and loved them at different points during the year, depending on what was going on! Whether his phone rang at 2am or 2pm with the Police informing him that there were stock out on any particular road, he would be straight on his quad bike or in the truck to get them back in.

He was a man with such integrity and a character who could 'hold court' in any place he walked into. If you didn't know David was in a room, you soon would by the sound of his deep voice or his loud laugh! He will be sadly missed by many, me in particular. It seems like only the other day that we were singing karaoke, 'Sweet Caroline' in the Huntingfield Arms in May 2006 on the day we first met.

He always said to me that, if anything happened to him, please just have a bash at the Huntingfield Arms – no church service or fuss, and we certainly did that on Friday 17th November. Thank you again to everyone who came to raise a glass to him, we made him proud.

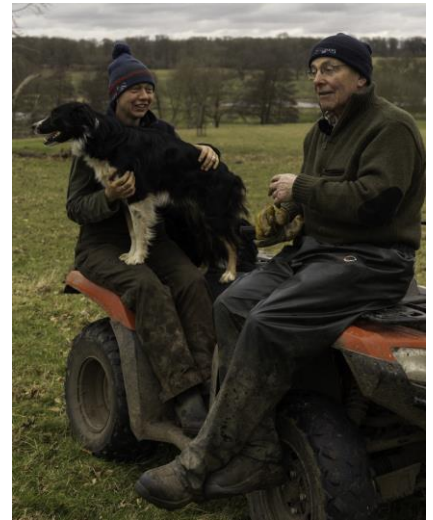

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History Corner



As Christmas approaches with its often performed 'A Christmas Carol', we can be reminded of how our lives have changed over the past two hundred years. However, a hundred years ago Tiny Tim's home life was not that much different from that of a family living in Ubbeston. Ralph Porter left us the following account of his life in the 1930s.

The cottage in Ubbeston Green was called Rose Cottage and it was two up two down. Just four rooms with uneven brick floors downstairs. One bedroom was a landing bedroom that you walked through to get to the other bedroom. Mum & Dad and my sister Alice (b.1923) slept in the front bedroom, Maurice (b.1921), Ken (b.1927) and I slept in the back bedroom. The door between the rooms was kept open and we had a candle on a small table to light both.

There was no running water so we had no bathroom or sinks. Water came from the pond in summer and soft water from tanks in the winter: we had to boil the water to get rid of 'wiggles'. In later years, a windmill pump was installed about 1/4 mile away which was a big improvement for the village, with much purer water. Everyone collected water in buckets and it was stored in cool pantries.

Jugs of water and bowls were put on a chair to wash ourselves. Bath time was a tin bath in front of the fire and all four of us bathed in turn in the same water, as water wasn't easy to come by. No turning on the taps, it had to be lugged up from the pond or soft water tanks according to the season or rainfall. As you can imagine by the time it got to the youngest, Ken, the water started to look a bit grey!

The toilet was a bumby in the garden, i.e. a shed with a wooden seat over a bucket. There was no such thing as toilet paper so we had newspapers cut into squares and hung on a piece of

wire. At night we used a pot under the bed as you didn't want to go into the garden in the middle of the night.

Mother cooked in our kitchen using a Dutch oven: an oven over a fireplace so you burnt wood underneath to heat it. The copper was also lit by a fire. In the summer, when it was too hot to have a fire, we used a paraffin cooker which had a long wick. I remember pushing my brother Ken in a cart that Dad made for us to collect firewood. There were only open fires in those days, no gas or electric available, and the fire had a trivet for the second saucepan, but we managed to enjoy meals that to us were great.

Mum had to go charring to bring in money to buy what we needed. She was the only breadwinner as father never worked. We lived "On the Parish". Some sort of village charity, I think. Once a week she used to walk two miles to Cook's farm to do a full day's work and washing for half a crown (2 shillings, 6d old money or now 121/2p) and a dinner included.

Friday nights were special. Mum would bake the bread for the week so by the next Friday it was getting a bit hard. She made a small loaf for each of us and also rice pudding for 'afters'. That, to us, was the highlight of the week. We didn't need much to keep us happy then.

We used to fetch milk from the farm in a metal can that had a handle and lid on it. There was a mill opposite and we used to buy a stone of flour that my mother kept in a massive stone jar in the pantry. We didn't know any different so we were happy with what we had. I'm sure we lived a more carefree life than the town children of today. We had virtually nothing so we were content with what we had.

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David's Column



The main topics discussed at the last Parish Council meeting were the flooding, in the centre of the village and on The Street, and the destruction of the roadside verges caused by the increasingly wide agricultural vehicles and also resulting from a general lack of respect by delivery lorries and vans. We were very lucky that no homes were flooded during the recent

storms although it was very close!

The flooding in the centre of the village was caused by water flowing down Brick Kiln Lane due to a blocked drainage ditch halfway up the hill. This accumulated at the crossroads where a drainage ditch was also blocked. Both were dug out by staff from The Estate but this was only temporary as, during the next downpour, the upper ditch blocked and flooded again. A small working group is being put together to consider permanent solutions.

The flood on The Street was primarily caused by the ditches being blocked when heavy traffic using the verges to pass oncoming vehicles push the verge into the ditch: water flooded from the fields onto the road but then had nowhere to run as it could not flow into the ditches or the Carnser. The PC will be contacting the farmers whose equipment use The Street to ask

their drivers to have more respect for the verges. Following the latest floods, staff from Hillfairs Farms have dug out the ditches and reinstated the verges.

Julie Collett presented the data collected from SID (Speed Indicator Device). Very satisfyingly, it showed the majority of traffic passing the device was travelling just below the 30mph limit. However, we continue to investigate the 20's Plenty idea, which, of course, will not progress without approval from the village.

We have now received over £20,000 from the Community Infrastructure Levy Fund which must be used for infrastructure projects within the village. We are considering various options but the consensus at the last meeting was that it would be well spent addressing the flooding issues.

Within the next week or two signs will be put in place asking people to pick up their dog poo. The signs were drawn by Kids Club, laminated, and put onto posts by Brian Lucas. Once again, we ask that you have respect for your local community and pick up after your pooch!

As we enter the Christmas season there are plenty of events in the village to bring us all together. I hope to see you at the Big Switch On at the Arms, the Christmas Dinner in the Hub, the candle-lit carol service in the church or the carol singing on the Green.

throughout December breakfast Friday will continue, as will fresh doughnuts and bread on Thursdays. All are absolutely delicious and make it definitely worth calling by.

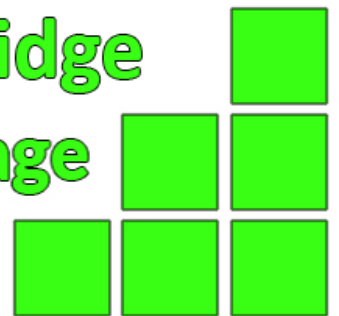
Thursday 7th December will be the last Charity Quiz Night of the year with free chips for all quizzers. £2.50 per person with a maximum of four to a team.
