Coronation Celebration





Hub News

Highlights from Hub trustees' annual report 2022-23

Following the previous two year's disruption and closure caused by Covid the past year has been a time for restating the value of this great community resource. Since reopening, the Hub's trustees and management team have restated their commitment to being accessible to all so that the Hub can consistently deliver the resources and services local residents will most value. Inevitably the effects of recovery and rebuilding post-Covid led to a substantial negative financial position for the year, but fortunately the Hub had received some significant grants during the pandemic, which were designed specifically to help organisations like ours through the expected downturn. So, 2022/23 has been a year for rebuilding and putting in place a new structure and approach for the Hub and its trustees.

In February 2023 the Hub trustees and management team held their first open evening, to which all residents of the three villages were invited. This led to the drafting of priorities for future activities, some of which have already been put into action. The trustees are committed to hold more meetings in the future, (an AGM was held on 22nd May) and are calling for all residents to support their Hub positively.

Despite starting from a very low base the past year has seen a considerable expansion of the Hub's regular activities, mostly gathering pace towards the end of the year, plus some losses too as some who use the Hub's services have curtailed their activities due to rising costs.

The team remains optimistic that the coming year will see further growth with more regular classes and events for our communities such as family film and pizza nights. There will be more for the kids to do too with the Hub hosting a new youth club and toddler story-time sessions.

Thanks are due to all Hub supporters and users, to the management team, Charlie Yule and Alex Dipple and to the dozens of volunteers who give their time and expertise so regularly, consistently and cheerfully to help the Hub put on events and activities for all local people. Thanks to one of our residents the lovely environs of Huntingfield are soon to be celebrated in print. Charlie



Yule, who is currently studying for a Masters in Creative and Critical Writing at Suffolk University has had work accepted for an creative anthology featuring Suffolk waterways called 'Suffolk Reflections', third in a series

following 'Suffolk Folk' and 'Suffolk Arboretum'.

Rather than feature the larger waterways of the area Charlie based her story on the adventures of a young girl exploring Huntingfield, incorporating the network of streams that run through the village. The publication will feature a QR code that will link to an interactive map which visitors can use to lead them around the area.

This isn't Charlie's first venture into publishing. Most recently, she had a piece included in a collection entitled 'Modern Nature Anthology' in memory of Derek Jarman's nature inspired life writing. She has previously worked in publishing and has wide experience in teaching and youth outreach work, mainly related to the promotion of writing with young people. Nature Notes

Migration has featured prominently in recent news bulletins and it is also much in evidence locally in the natural world. Our Swifts have made their way back to local villages and towns and are making



their presence known by screaming, both flightwise and vocally, around our rooftops. They are a remarkable, ancient species and have inhabited the earth for at least 60 million years. They have long, sickle-shaped wings and are entirely dark grey/brown in colour, unlike Swallows and Martins which have white underparts.

Considering that Swifts nest, in most cases, close to humans in the roofs just above our heads there is still a lot that we don't know about these 'Devil

Nesting is the only time that they aren't actually flying: they don't breed until they are 2-3 years old, so an individual will fly non-stop for up to three years! Sadly, Swift numbers in the UK are on the decline, with over half the breeding population lost since 1995. The reasons for this are still unclear and scientists from the British Trust for Ornithology, amongst others, are involved in gathering data to fill the gaps in our analysis. Technology is helping us to understand more and includes the use of tiny GPS devices.

We have a number of other birds breeding locally that have also made the long hazardous journey back from Africa, many having crossed the Sahara. These include warblers such as the Blackcap, Whitethroat, Chiffchaff and Reed Warbler.

I have been studying the local population of Reed Warblers nesting in the reeds around the edges of the lakes at Heveningham Hall. Whilst the reed beds themselves are nowhere near as extensive as those along the coastal sites such as Minsmere, I have been surprised at how many pairs we

have breeding nearby. My estimation is upwards of 200 pairs around the lakes in the valley between Heveningham and Walpole. I have been netting and ringing these birds for the last two years and captures in recent sessions have shown that a high percentage (c. 80%) breeding here this year were also here in 2021.



It still seems unbelievable that these tiny birds spend our winter in West African countries such as Senegal and then navigate all the way back to the same reed bed each summer. Quite rightly, it is deemed an

incredible navigation feat when human-beings cross oceans, deserts and other wild places - but we need technology to aid us. These, and other birds, only have the use of their own inbuilt faculties using a brain that would easily fit on one of our finger tips. So, I believe we should cherish these creatures that brighten our spring mornings with the dawn chorus and give them the thought, space and undisturbed habitat such as hedges etc. whilst they are sharing this time with us.

History Corner: Social Climbing, 18th Century Style

Eleazar Davy was born in Huntingfield in 1724 to a farmer, David Davy (1680-1764) and his wife, Elizabeth Sheene (1684 -1762). In 1737 the 13-year-old was apprenticed to Henry Aldrick, an Apothecary in Halesworth. The boy was to become a long-term tenant of Ubbeston Hall between c1748 and 1779 and later the

owner of a mansion, The Grove, in Yoxford. Thomas Gainsborough, painted his portrait in 1775 and gave it the title Eleazar Davy of the Grove, Yoxford, Suffolk.

From the relatively humble beginnings of a local farming family, Eleazar later began to move in more lofty circles. His memorial tablet in Yoxford Church states he was 'for many years an active and useful magistrate'. Whilst living at Ubbeston Hall, he married Frances Ann Warter Wilson, nee Evans, daughter of the Right Honourable George Evans, Lord Carbery, on 8 October 1766 at St James' Westminster. According to Manners he 'acquired some local position by the marriage of his stepdaughter with Sir John Rous, afterwards Earl of Stradbroke'. Eleazar had connections with other quite powerful families too, such as the Blois family of Cockfield Hall in Yoxford and the Kemps in Ubbeston, including standing as executor for their wills etc. By 1770,

Eleazar Davy had become Lord High Sheriff of Suffolk, whilst still living in Ubbeston.

During the 1770s, Eleazar bought The Grove in Yoxford, nowadays called Grove Park. It was originally a late 16th century building, which Eleazar developed into his 'Mansion House'. By 1798, the Land Redemption Tax tells us Davy owned lands in Yoxford, Ubbeston, Wissett, Westhall and Walberswick.

Eleazar, had no children and outlived his wife by two years, dying in 1803 at the age of 79. He wanted his home, contents and furnishings to stay the same after his death and his future inheritors had to comply. There was also an expressed wish that future owners would take the name Davy and the Coat of Arms Eleazar had acquired. This was addressed in 1852 when the London Gazette reported that Queen Victoria granted to 'Lucy Elizabeth Barlee, of The Grove, in the parish of Yoxford, in the county of Suffolk ... Her royal licence and authority that, in compliance with a proviso contained in the last will and testament of her uncle Eleazar Davy... she may henceforth assume and use the surname and arms of Davy...'

So, not quite a rags to riches story but certainly a rise to power by a local lad.

The Annual Parish Meeting, the Annual Meeting of the PC and a standard meeting all took place on Thursday 18th May in the Hub. This



Weather report: April - May 2023



Well, another two months on since my last report: how time flies! In two days from today (27th May) we will be officially in a drought as it will be 15 days since I last recorded rainfall. Even so, there has been more rain in May this year than in 2022. In fact, 0.78"(19.81mm) more. Again, in April this year rainfall was considerably higher than in April last year - up by 2.38" (60.45mm).

So, there is quite a contrast from the dry spring of last year. To date we are 5.46" (138.68mm) ahead of the same period 2022. Yes, we can blame the jet-stream again. The increased rain was due to it sitting south of the UK, allowing more Atlantic weather to cross us. It is now to the north, allowing a large anticyclone to sit over us with a clockwise wind flow circulating around it thus subjecting us to cold winds off the still quite cold, North Sea, with no sign of it shifting just yet.

What's the summer going to be like? Who knows? But I know I'm going to have to water my seeds! Richard Tyler

David's Column



It was lovely to see a good turnout at the Huntingfield Annual Village Meeting/PC AGM/PC meeting last week. There seems to be a number of recurring issues which

concern us villagers. Firstly, potholes and damage to verges caused by heavy/wide commercial and agricultural traffic; secondly, hedges and trees that are allowed to grow and overhang the road surface; thirdly, the disrepair of village properties owned by the Heveningham Estate.

The overgrown hedges and trees are of real concern as they leave nowhere for pedestrians, equestrians or cyclists to go when traffic approaches. They also cause damage to wing mirrors and scratches to car bodywork and contribute to the disintegration of the verges as traffic has to drive well to one side of the road to avoid damage. In this issue of The Hare we have provided guidance from Suffolk County Council. If you own any such overhanging hedges or trees we would urge you to address the issue as soon as possible.

You may be aware that we are in receipt of funds from the Community Infrastructure Levy which originates from the construction of the three holiday lodges at Valley Farm by Wilderness Reserve. To date we have received over £4,000, with more to come. This has to be spent on 'the provision, improvement, replacement, operation or maintenance of infrastructure'. Typically, such things as play areas, open spaces, cultural and sports facilities. At the last PC meeting it was agreed to spend some funds to help construct a shelter on the Millennium Green for use by the petanque team and villagers in general.

Huntingfield Parish Council would very much like to hear from anyone in the village who has ideas about what more the money can be spent on. So that everyone in the village can have their say we would like to compile a list of suggested projects that we can put to a vote.
